One of the highlights of this part of our trip was the evening sky tour given by astronomer Ian at the Ayers Rock Observatory. The Milky Way and Southern Hemisphere were spectacular from the clear skies of the outback. The 17th of June was the ultimate Australian day, we started it with a camel ride around Uluru and finished it at the Sydney Opera House!

The first day we took the world's longest gondola ride up the Kuranda Rain Forrest. The rain forests in the region are the oldest on the planet, descending from the time when all the continents were together in Gwanda. Some of the ferns in this area have been around for 110 million years. We took what is considered one of the worlds most scenic train rides back down town. That evening we went to Reef School, where we learned and laughed a lot from Irish marine biologist Paddy. The next day we headed out to Green Island on the reef, where we actually went scuba diving.
